The Pulmonary Hypertension Association offers three major awards each year to support cutting-edge research on pulmonary hypertension.

By sponsoring researchers at the forefront of the field, PHA actively ensures a brighter future for those with PH.



The American Thoracic Society / Pulmonary Hypertension Association Partnership Grant for PH

Co-funded by the American Thoracic Society (ATS) and PHA, the ATS/PHA Partnership Grant annually awards up to two researchers conducting novel studies of pulmonary hypertension.

This award is intended for new faculty-level investigators who are within one to five years of completing their training, and who are seeking additional research training under a mentor with extensive experience in pulmonary hypertension.

One of the investigators must be an ATS member at the time of the application, and the principal investigator must be an ATS member at the time the grant is awarded.

Pulmonary Hypertension Association Research Fellowship Award

Each year, PHA in collaboration with the American Heart Association selects two outstanding people who have recently received a PhD, MD, DO, or equivalent degree for a two-year grant.

This award is intended for individuals who seek additional supervised research training.

Applicants with more than five years of postgraduate research experience or faculty rank are not eligible.

Mentored Clinical Scientist Award (K08) / Mentored Patient-Oriented Research Career Development Award (K23) - A PHA/NHLBI Partnership

Each year, PHA and the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI) awards one of the following grants for three to five years of supervised research on pulmonary hypertension:

- The Mentored Clinical Scientist Development Award (K08), which supports the development of outstanding clinician research scientists in the area of pulmonary hypertension.
- The Mentored Patient-Oriented Research Career Development Award (K23), which supports the career development of investigators who have made a commitment to focus their endeavors on patient-oriented research.
